Convict Cabinet-makers

On 18 September 2011 Robyn Lake addressed the Historical Society meeting with some findings from her many years of research into convict cabinet-makers during the early years of transportation to Van Diemen's Land. Robyn argued that mechanics were in demand and perhaps were "selected" to be sent to work for the government in the fledgling colony. Her talk focussed on four convicts. John Waterhouse, initially sent to Sydney, was transferred to Hobart where he was employed on government works. John Graham, charged with stealing Rev. Robert Knopwood's boat, was sent to Macquarie Harbour where he made chairs. Thomas Chase brought his tools with him when he was transported. In 1829 he was one of 178 mechanics engaged in the Hobart lumber yard making tables, chairs, spinning wheels for the Female Factory and firescreens for Government House. The final profile was on John Miles who worked in the Perth-Norfolk Plains area. Amongst other jobs he fitted out Silwood, which since has been demolished. Robyn's research into the convict cabinet-makers can bring the furniture to life.

O'Connor and Bryan

Andrew Gregg presented a paper on the relationship between two Irishmen, Roderick O'Connor and William Bryan. In 1824, they arrived together in VDL on the *Ardent*. Both men, who settled in the Norfolk Plains area, had much in common as landed gentry. However, the friendship soured when Bryan was accused of stealing cattle, had his convict servants withdrawn at harvest and shearing time, and engaged in disputes with police magistrate Lyttleton and Governor Arthur. Bryan left VDL in 1835, returning to London and Wicklow, Ireland. A William Bryan was murdered in Ireland in 1838. Was this the one in question?

November Talk

Steve Radford, Holymans – 150 years

2011 is the sesquicentenary of the founding of the White Star Line/Holymans sea-air-road transport empire. It included shipping services, both intra-state and inter-state, between Tasmania, NSW, Victoria and South Australia. After taking over Flinders Island Airlines around 1934, the company eventually founded Australian National Airways which basically was the pioneering airline system for South East Australia. Despite government opposition and favouritism to the Government airline, Holymans succeeded in keeping going until 1957 when Ansett took over the airline business. However, it continued in shipping until 1987 when selling the last vessel, *Mary Holyman*. The company name still exists but has been absorbed well and truly into firstly Patrick and now Toll. It has a rich history of transport in this country and is one of the all-time great family business empires in Australia.

Steve believes that the story of the "empire" needs to be told. There has never been a book written about Holymans' shipping; only of Australian National Airways. It has an interesting opening in that Captain William Holyman senior jumped overboard from the *Elizabeth Radcliffe* anchored at George Town in 1855, slipped away and swam ashore. Just as well he did for that vessel was never heard of again.

History Prize

The Society held another successful History Prize in this International Year of Women addressing the topic 'Australian Women Building Our Nation'. Thank you to the judges Leonie Prevost, Andrew Gregg and Robyn Jones for selecting the prize-winners from all the excellent CDs, posters and booklets received.

Eighty-four students from grades 3 to 6 from four Launceston schools submitted 79 entries covering a diverse range of Australian women who have contributed to the building of our nation. The participating schools were Mowbray Heights, Riverside and West Launceston Primary Schools and Scotch Oakburn Junior School. As the standard was so high this year the judges have decided to award 20 prizes with a total value of \$775.00 worth of book vouchers. A list of winners will be published in the December Newsletter.

A presentation ceremony will not be held this year. Instead, the prizes will be awarded to the students in their own school assemblies.

Oatlands Excursion

The trip to Oatlands on Sunday 30 October was a resounding success. Twenty-one members of the Society enjoyed the bus trip and walking tour of the historic town. Thank you to bus driver Terese Binns and to leader Steve Radford who provided a commentary on properties and personalities along the Heritage Highway. After a morning tea of delicious scones at the Oatlands District Historical Society's History Room our knowledgeable tour co-ordinator Graeme Raphael guided us through the industrial precinct of the Callington Mill (1837) complex, to the military precinct. We were fascinated by the worn steps of the gaoler's residence (1834-1836) and were pleased to see that more restoration work is in progress. There are plans to relocate the sandstone gateway of the old gaol from its present position in the main street to its original location at the entrance of the gaol. Walking across to the old Supreme Court House (1829), we marvelled at the 1834 additions by architect John Lee Archer.

After lunch at The Kentish Hotel we took the bus to the exquisite Pugin-designed St Paul's Catholic Church (1850) where Vera Fisher gave us a wonderful overview of the history of the church. We visited St Peter's Anglican Church (1838) and associated cemetery before driving to Maher's Point overlooking Lake Dulverton. A ramble around the General Cemetery (1827) was interesting, with the largest monument being to Samuel Page who ran coaches between Launceston and Hobart and beyond. On the return drive we detoured to Tunbridge to see the Blind Chapel, the old Victoria Hotel and one of Samuel Page's coaches. (Marion Sargent)
