Encounters in Place

On 21 October 2012 Professor John Mulvaney, renowned archaeologist from Canberra, presented an illustrated talk on the encounters between early British and French explorers at Adventure Bay and Recherche Bay in southern Tasmania. He focussed on the period from 1773 to 1793. Relations between the Europeans and Aborigines were friendly. Each group was intrigued to learn about the others. Shell necklaces and medals were exchanged; songs were sung; Aboriginal words were recorded; and drawings were made of the people. Mulvaney successfully nominated Recherche Bay to be listed on the National Register, not just because of the French garden, but to honour the interactions between the sailors and Aborigines.

10 Murray Street & Henty House

On 18 November 2012, architect and heritage consultant Paul Johnston was the final guest speaker for the year. His talk concentrated on two government buildings which often are The brutal post-war referred to as ugly. architecture called for simple materials like concrete to construct functional, modern and arguably beautiful buildings. As Paul said, "Appreciation of buildings and architecture changes over time." Architects in Hobart were outraged when it was proposed to demolish 10 Murray Street. They see Dirk Bolt's creation as the best tall building in Tasmania. By the time Henty House was built in Launceston's Civic Square, there was a change in thinking. Peter Partridge took his inspiration from the National Theatre in London, with a lower profile more fitting in the historic precinct.

Dr Frank Madill, Sanders DFC: Out of the Darkness

Dr Frank Madill's lecture will cover the story of the writing of his book *Sanders DFC – Out of the Darkness* – how he came to choose the subject, the research involved, and the process of writing, self-publishing and marketing.

Biography:

Frank Madill was born at Pakenham Bush Nursing Hospital, east of Melbourne, in 1941. Graduating from Melbourne University in 1965, he moved to Launceston where he spent nearly twenty years as a full-time GP in the northern suburbs. Somehow he also found time to run a Romney Marsh sheep stud. Frank was elected a state parliamentarian in 1986. He became a Minister in 1996. He retired from parliament in 2000 and since then has practised medicine part-time.

In 2004, Frank began part-time lecturing at both the University of Tasmania and the Australian Maritime College. In 2005 he published his best-selling book *If You Faint, Fall Backwards! Medicine: Warts and All.* This was followed in 2006 by *It all Comes Back to Sheep! Farming: Warts and All.*

Well-known around Launceston for his work on radio, singing and community work, Frank is married to Linda and has two daughters, Christine and Catherine.

The Examiner-John West Memorial Lecture

Professor Lucy Frost

The children of mothers in the convict system of Van Diemen's Land

Friday 15 March 2013 – 8.00pm at the Sir Raymond Ferrall Centre, UTAS at Newnham.

Many women who stood in the docks of the British Empire to hear themselves sentenced to transportation beyond the Seas were mothers. Sentences imposed on mothers fractured the lives of their children. Some would be left behind: to be cared for by relatives; to fend for themselves on the streets; or to suffer the grimness of a workhouse. Others would sail with their mothers on the convict transports, facing their own experiences of exile. In Van Diemen's Land, either they would go into a nursery run as part of a Female Factory, or be sent to the Orphan Schools. Later, while convict women served their sentences in the colony, some would become pregnant, and give birth in a Female Factory—only to be separated from their infants once they were weaned.

This paper explores the experiences of the children, looking at the convict system from their perspective. By focussing on the stories of individual children, it asks what happened when their freedom was compromised and the most intimate contours of their lives forever changed in those courtrooms where their mothers were sentenced.

Biography (from the UTAS website):

Professor Lucy Frost is an Honorary Research Professor in the Department of English, Journalism and European Languages at the University of Tasmania. She was appointed as an Emeritus Professor at UTAS in 2009. She has particular interests in how the past is 'read', and in how those readings are translated into what is called 'cultural heritage'. At present she is asking how one 'reads' the experiences of female convicts transported to Van Diemen's Land, and how one turns those readings into the products of cultural heritage tourism. She has held an ARC Discovery Grant to look at female convicts as women travellers; is a member of the Board of the Female Factory Historic Site (Cascades); co-convenor of the Female Factory Research Group; and a member of the Board of the Tasman Institute for Conservation and Convict Studies. In 2005 with the support provided by a grant from the Sustainable Tourism CRC she created the first site-specific guide to the Female Factory, *Footsteps and Voices*, which was launched in November at the Female Factory Muster, of which she was co-convenor.

Lucy has designed and taught a wide range of units in the fields of American, Australian, and Women's Studies. She is currently teaching an honours unit, 'Endangered Bodies in Colonial Space', and is supervising postgraduate students.
