#### **Guest Speaker Dr Stefan Petrow**

At the AGM on Sunday 16 February 2014 Dr Stefan Petrow presented an interesting talk on the origins of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. The Launceston Society was established in 1879. It strove to change attitudes by education and sometimes prosecution. Women were predominant in the Society; but for the first 51 years the Mayor was chairman. For horses and dogs, the Society provided water troughs – two of which still survive today. Prizes were awarded at shows for the best-cared-for horses. This created keen competition, particularly among wood carters.

# Marita Bardenhagen Memorial Award for Local History

The Marita Bardenhagen Memorial Award for Local History was launched on Friday 28 February 2014 by the Minister for Heritage, the Hon. Brian Wightman. Almost 50 of Marita's friends, family and colleagues attended the launch in Launceston.

The Marita Bardenhagen Memorial Award for Local History is a biennial prize to honour the memory of well-known Tasmanian historian Dr Marita Bardenhagen. The aim of the Award is to encourage local historians to publish the results of their research. The Award is for a book with significant Tasmanian local history content. The Award will be determined by an independent judging panel of three, approved by the Trustees of the Award. Entries for the inaugural Award will close on 14 June 2014. His topic Launceston to Launceston From Perspectives on the Cornish in Australia discussion generated much on the pronunciation of the town with that name in Cornwall, England. Philip's entertaining lecture focussed on the connections between Cornish visitors and migrants who came to Australia. He was introduced by Martin Gilmour, Editor of The Examiner, and Professor Michael Bennett offered a vote of thanks. #### Jenny Gill: Early Launceston Hospitals

Sunday 13 April 2014 – 2.00pm at the Meeting Room, QVMAG at Inveresk.

In early 1831, several of Jenny Gill's ancestors arrived free in Launceston; others came in chains. Where did our ancestors seek medical help? Jenny will talk on Launceston's health care facilities before the Launceston General Hospital was opened in 1863.



Jenny attended Broadland House School, after which she was to follow a mixed career. As a member of St John's Church, she discovered her love of local history and, for the last 30 years, has studied many aspects of our community's history. Jenny was a founding member of the Launceston Historical Society, and has presented several papers at our meetings. Apart from writing local histories, over Christmas, Jenny – together with John Dent – prepared all the research for *The Sharland Map 1826* project recently launched on the Launceston City Council's website. #### Monuments and Monkeys: A Walk in Historic City Park

Sunday 18 May 2014 – 2.00pm, at the City Park Gates, Tamar Street, Launceston

For the National Trust Heritage Festival this year, Launceston Historical Society Committee members will conduct a walk in historic City Park. Meet at the gates in Tamar Street before 2.00pm for the start of the walk. Many layers of history in the Park will be explored: from the 1807 Government Cottage to the Launceston Horticultural Society gardens; Tasmanian tigers to monkeys; Albert Hall and the Tasmanian Exhibition; besides fountains, statues, cannon, pear tree, bandstands, church and hall, gardens and memorials. It is all here in what was and is – the People's Park. Afterwards enjoy tea and scones at Victoria's Café on City Park for \$5.00 while browsing through the display of many old photographs of the Park.
