

In March 2015 Julian Burnside presented the 27<sup>th</sup> *The Examiner*-John West Memorial Lecture with the topic *We can do much better*. We were delighted that approximately 700 people attended the lecture at the Albert Hall. President Marion Sargent was the master of ceremonies, Professor David Rich gave a brief address on the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the University of Tasmania, Mr Burnside was introduced

by Mark Baker, Editor of *The Examiner*; while LHS Secretary Prue McCausland offered a vote of thanks.

This year the John West Memorial lecturer will be political journalist Michelle Grattan AO – speaking on *The Power of One* – at the Sir Raymond Ferrall Centre, University of Tasmania at Newnham on Friday 18 March 2016 at 8.00pm.

We are grateful for sponsorship and support of *The Examiner* and the University for this prestigious event.

#### **Monthly meetings**

Once again we have had an interesting and varied number of speakers who gave their time and expertise to present papers at our monthly Sunday meetings. In 2015 these were: Dr Tom Dunning who presented the case for a new history of Launceston; Julian Burgess who gave an insight into the experiences of an ambulance man during World War One; Anne Neale who presented the Heritage Festival event of an illustrated virtual walk from Prince's Square to the War Memorial; Dr Rod Westhorpe who gave the Pugh Day lecture on the development of anaesthetics; and Dr John Paull who spoke on the travels of 'Count' Strzelecki.

In August we watched a DVD compiled by the late John Shepherd on Max Oldaker's tourist walk through central Launceston. Marion Sargent gave a talk on some of the old cemeteries of Launceston; and John Watts spoke about the outer leads of the Tamar River. The final speaker for the year was Anne Neale who entertained us with stories of the rogue and vagabond Henry Bridges (alias Horace Bennett). The Christmas meeting included a mini book fair with Historical Society members selling their books.

We appreciate the generous support of the Queen Victoria Museum, Inveresk, for providing the meeting room for our monthly meetings. And thank you also to Haben who capably looked after our audio visual needs.

#### **Spring Excursion**

In November a busload of members enjoyed a history tour to the House of Anvers Chocolate Factory at Latrobe, and the Bass Strait Maritime Centre and Home Hill at Devonport. Thank you to Terese Binns who once again drove the Veterans and Community Bus.

#### **History Prize**

The 2015 Launceston Historical Society History Prize for primary school students received 61 individual entries and one class project. The three participating schools were: Riverside and Mowbray Heights Primary Schools and St Thomas More's Catholic Primary School. The judges awarded 18 prizes of book vouchers from Volume2 Bookshop. Thank you to Carol Fuller for

organising the History Prize with assistance from Georgia Fountoulaki and Jenny Gill. Thanks also to Mayor Albert van Zetten who presented the prizes and certificates at the Town Hall on Thursday 26 November.

The Senior Secondary Ratcliff Prize for History of \$200 was awarded to six students: Sophie Bodell, Launceston College; Chelsey Grandfield, Newstead College; Abigael Stubbs, Scotch Oakburn College; Tristan Jamson, Launceston Church Grammar School; Georgia Strickland, St Patrick's College; and Faith Stellmaker, the Launceston Christian School.

The annual \$500 Launceston Historical Society - Dr Marita Bardenhagen History Prize was shared by two first-year university students Logan Krushka and Robert Evans.

#### **Executive Committee**

The extent of events and activities conducted by the Historical Society would not be possible without the many hours of work performed by a dedicated team of volunteers. Thank you to the other members of the Executive Committee who have helped to make this Society what it is today.
