April Talk

Craig Deayton: Blinded by Blood: The AIF on the Western front: Myth, Tragedy and the Threat to History

Sunday 17 April 2016 – 2.00pm at the Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum at Inveresk

No aspect of Australian history in the 20th Century has been more chronicled, more discussed and more remembered than the First World War. Yet no other aspect of Australian history is so misunderstood. Despite the life's work of the nation's finest historian in Charles Bean and despite the famously detailed and rigorously accurate Official History that he authored, the greatest achievements of the AIF and its commanders on the Western Front, along with the darkest moments in that history, are little known today.



Although the enormous sacrifice of the Great War is memorialised with pride, and ever more so as we move through its centenary, the myths about the AIF

and their experience on the Western Front show no sign of receding. Bean concluded his masterly official history with the dedication that it was 'a monument to great hearted men; and, for their nation, a possession forever.' That possession is under threat as never before, not from neglect nor from a failure to remember, but from a wilfulness to have our history not as we have it, but as we would wish it to be. It has become captive to a romantic and idealised nostalgia about the men of the AIF and a fascination with their tragedies which overshadows the very much larger, very much more important, sometimes glorious and occasionally darker truth.

This paper will examine the impact of the modern preference for memorialisation over memory and the implications for history. Through brief case studies of two of the AIF's battles on the Western Front it will argue that the popularity of myth and tragedy overshadows the much more interesting reality and indeed completely ignores the key turning points of the First World War where Australian troops played central roles. It will conclude that we have a responsibility to honour the sacrifice of the nation in the First World War not by romanticising it, nor by returning again and again to the bottomless well of sorrow, but by seeking, acknowledging and, above all, knowing the truth of their story.

Craig Deayton is a history teacher with a special interest in Australia's military history. He has worked as a teacher and College Principal for over 30 years and is currently Principal of Sacred Heart College, Hobart. He is the author of *Battled Scarred: The 47th Battalion in the First World War* published in 2011.

May Talk

John Dent OAM: Kerry Lodge Archaeology Project

Sunday 15 May 2016 – 2.00pm at the Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum at Inveresk



The Kerry Lodge Bridge, still in use just south of Franklin Village, was commenced in 1834. A gang of convicts quarried bluestone from nearby hills, lived on site and built the bridge which was finished in 1836. The road crossing the bridge was also built by convicts at around the same time.

The convict housing is believed to have been used as a probation station, road gang and hiring depot until approximately 1847. The site had the capacity to house 60 convicts, but it appears that no more than 34 convicts and a superintendent lived there at any one time.

The bridge remains today as does part of the route of the old road to Hobart.

Evidence of bluestone and gravel quarries has been located. There are remains of two houses, one that was in existence earlier than 1843, and the remnants of a stone building, reputedly the site of the probation station.

There are many questions to be answered as to the actual location and extent of the probation station and whether or not any of the three known building sites were part of the probation station. If not where was the probation station site?

U.K. Archaeologist Eleanor Casella is working with the Launceston Historical Society Archaeology Group, the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery and others to use archaeology to help answer some of these questions. A test pit was dug in February 2015 and a more extensive excavation was undertaken in March/April 2016.

This talk will provide an historical background to events that occurred at that time; will look at the current landscape; and provide preliminary results of the recent archaeological excavations.

John Dent is a registered land surveyor in private practice in Launceston. He has combined this with an interest in the early history of Launceston and York Town to look more closely at many of the early surveyors and the records they left behind.

Kerry Lodge Open Day

June – Fifth Pugh Day Lecture

John Paull and Aileen Pike: Persistence Pays: Finding Dr Pugh's Missing Journal

Sunday 19 June 2016 – 2.00pm at the Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum at Inveresk

Dr William Russ Pugh's handwritten Journal of his voyage from England to Van Diemen's Land is first mentioned in the *Illustrated Tasmanian Mail* Christmas Issue of 1934. Three years after publishing Pugh's Biography and seven years after starting a search for the Journal it has finally been found – in Bristol, England. This lecture brings you the story of the search and unpublished highlights of Pugh's life, including an escape from pirates in the Cape de Verde Islands, as described by the intrepid Doctor.

Dr John Paull, a retired anaesthetist and **Mrs Aileen Pike**, a genealogist, together discovered the whereabouts of the Journal and arranged for a copy to be provided.

The Pugh Day Lecture is jointly sponsored by the Launceston General Hospital Historical Committee and the Launceston Historical Society.

NEW LAUNCESTON THEATRE OPENED BY THE MAYOR

LAUNCESTON, August 30.

The new Princess Theatre was opened to-night by the Mayor (Alderman W.C. Oldham), in the presence of the aldermen and prominent citizens. The building, which has seating accommodation for nearly 2,000, was crowded.

The Mayor congratulated Mr. M. Lucas on his enterprise in building such a magnificent theatre, which, he said, would supply a long-felt want, and there would be no further excuses for good companies saying that they could not visit Launceston. Mr. Lucas, in establishing this theatre, and becoming a citizen of Launceston, had shown that he had faith in the progress of the city.

Mr. Lucas briefly responded.

Senator Keating said that, although Mr. Lucas might be lacking in confidence in making a speech, he did not lack confidence in Launceston or its people, and he hoped that his enterprise would receive the public support that it deserved.

A flashlight photograph was then taken of the audience, and a moving-picture entertainment was given.

The stage is not yet complete, but as soon as it is finished several companies will appear in rapid succession.
