Louisa Anne Meredith

On 14 April 2019 Maureen Martin Ferris presented a fascinating account of the life of Louisa Anne Meredith, née Twamley. Louisa was not amused when her uncle George Meredith asked her to be a governess to his children in Van Diemen's Land. But letters and objects her cousin Charles Meredith sent back to England piqued her adventurous, restless and enquiring spirit. They married in 1839 and set out for New South Wales. before moving to Little Swanport, VDL in 1840. Charles was not a good manager or businessman, so they moved often seeking new opportunities. Although Louisa regretted leaving England, she found solace in her keen observation of the plants and animals of her new homeland. In 1878 she was a co-founder of the Society of Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Her memory lives on in her 29 beautifully illustrated books, and four each of pamphlets, songs and journal articles published between 1835 and 1891. Road and Probation Stations in Northern Tasmanian

John Dent delivered a fascinating talk on 19 May 2019 to a full house. His amended topic on convict stations revealed the 27 that he has identified so far in Northern Tasmania. Road and probation stations set up over a 30-year period from the 1830s housed the convicts building the roads. As work on the roads progressed a new station established farther along the line of road enabled the men to walk to their work sites. The existing plans of stations show that they were of a rectangular shape with the superintendent's house located about



metres from the barracks. The sites are difficult to find as they were: often named after a near-by farm; depicted incorrectly on maps; mostly constructed from timber; built over by towns; materials removed for use in new buildings; ploughed over and farmed: destroyed during later road works or by bushfires. John would appreciate help in identifying, researching and documenting the road station sites before developments obscure them forever.

Paul Myles is Professor and Director of the Department of Anaesthesiology and Perioperative Medicine at the Alfred Hospital in Melbourne, and at Monash University, Australia. He is an Australian National Health and Medical Research Council Practitioner Fellow, and Fellow of the Australian Academy of Health and Medical Science; an Editor of the *British Journal of Anaesthesia* and an Editorial Consultant for *The Lancet*. He has published more than 300 articles, and been awarded more than 25 NHMRC grants totalling more than \$35 million. The main focus of his research has been on patient quality of recovery, avoidance of postoperative complications, and large multicentre trials in perioperative medicine. In 2017 he received the Excellence in Research Award from the American Society of Anesthesiologists.

Sunday 21 July 2019 – 2pm at the Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum at Inveresk Duncan Grant, Small churches of Northern Tasmania



Duncan Grant spent 20 years at St Patrick's College Launceston as a senior teacher of Modern History and Ancient History (Rome) and Studies of Religion. He completed Honours and Masters degrees (History) at the University of Cape Town with a focus on urban history. He taught Economic History at the University of Cape Town and 'History Method' at Rhodes University (Grahamstown). He has an interest in curriculum development and designing courses for the study of local and regional history for high school students. Duncan now pursues history as a hobby and has a particular interest in historical buildings of any type and combines this with amateur photography.

ABSTRACT: Since the settlement of Tasmania approximately 1200 churches have been built. Each of these churches feature in Duncan's "blog" – "Churches in Tasmania". He uses the blog and social media to highlight the place and importance that 'church' and religion once held in Tasmanian society.

The blog approaches each church as a lens through which to appreciate aspects of life of rural and urban communities. The local church was a place that transmitted values and culture; channelled knowledge of the outside world; bonded communities; empowered women; fostered education; reflected status; reinforced class and sectarian interests; and formed a defence against perceived social threats and ills.

Duncan's presentation will highlight a few of the lesser known, 'smaller' and 'forgotten' churches in Launceston and the surrounding region and explore how some of these buildings contribute to our understanding of the past.
