

Sunday 17 November 2019 – 2pm at the Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum at Inveresk Jill Cassidy, Writing the history of Deviot

In 2002 Jill Cassidy and her late husband Mike moved to Deviot and Jill immediately became interested in the history of the area. When she found very little written history she decided to hold a conference to get more information. The conference was successful but was largely focused on the 20th century. Notwithstanding the wonders of Trove, discovering information about the nineteenth century proved to be more difficult than she imagined, but a series of breakthroughs finally allowed her to write the first chapter of her book, *Deviot Talks*.

Jill Cassidy worked for 20 years in the History department of the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery. On retirement she was made an Honorary Research Officer. She is President of Oral History Tasmania and Vice-President of Oral History Australia. *Christmas hamper raffle tickets 3 for \$5.*

12th Primary History Prize Presentation


There were 114 entries from four schools -Mowbray Heights Primary School, Scotch Oakburn College, St Thomas More's, Sacred Heart and St Finn Barr's Catholic Schools. On 30 October 2019 Mayor Albert van Zetten handed out certificates, book vouchers from Petrarch's Bookshop, a volume of Stories in Stone and an LHS pencil to the 13 prize winners. This year UTAS teacher education students did the first level of judging and the History Prize sub-committee decided on the final winners. The first Rebecca Phillips Memorial Prize was awarded to Lulu Greig for her PowerPoint entry on "What became of Patterson's Plains?" The winning entries are on display at the Launceston Library until the end of November.

Cataract Gorge History

On 18 August 2019 president Marion Sargent presented an illustrated talk to a packed house on a brief history of the Cataract Gorge. From the first recorded sighting in 1804, the talk covered flour mills, bridges, pathways, rustic shelters, caretaker's cottage, tea rooms, band rotundas, power station, the 1929 floods and the generous donation of land in 1943 that promised to protect the amenity of the First Basin and Cliff Grounds area.

Edward Abbott Senior & Junior

On 15 September 2019 Tony Marshall gave a detailed presentation on the colonial saga of the two Edward Abbotts. Abbott senior was Civil Commandant in Launceston from January 1826 and died at Government Cottage in July 1832. He is buried in the Cypress Street Cemetery next to the 210-acre grant of the Launceston Swamp which Abbott junior spent 28 years trying to claim compensation for after Gov. Arthur said the grant was invalid.

Government Cottage, City Park

Lynette Ross presented her paper on the "House that William built" on 20 October 2019. It was a summary of her forthcoming book on the fascinating history of Government Cottage that housed Commandants, Governors, visiting dignitaries, clergymen, women immigrants from the *Amelia Thompson*, and Horticultural Society exhibits from 1807 to 1847. Leased to private tenants from 1848, it was in a state of disrepair and demolished in 1885.
