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

The Little Skipper: Sir John Evans

Nigel Burch presented a fascinating talk on 17 October 2021 on the little skipper, Captain Jack Evans, who progressed from cabin-boy to Premier. He followed his father to sea, worked his way up to become the captain of many ships, and suffered a couple of disasters. In 1883 the ss Tasman struck submerged rocks and went down so fast the piano went through the roof. With his ticket re-instated three years later, he was on the bridge of the *Esk* when it hit Hebe Reef. This time it was his fault, and Evans became suicidal. His father-in-law, James Harcourt, saved him by giving him a job in his ironmongery business. He went on to have a wonderful life - working hard as Captain of the ss Huon. Hobart's Master Warden, and in community work, as well as being an MHA for 40 years, including a reluctant Premier from 1904 to 1909. He championed full suffrage for all adults, free education, better school buildings, teacher training and decent salaries for teachers. The Upper House opposed him in all this, and Evans lamented in his memoirs that if only political leaders co-operated the community would benefit from progressive developments much earlier. Swansea Excursion



A bus load of happy members had a great day out to Swansea on 1 November on the annual Launceston Historical Society excursion. We watched school children parading in colonial costumes, visited the East Coast Heritage Museum, walked around the streets admiring the beautiful old buildings, and visited two cemeteries with stunning views towards Freycinet Peninsula. Maureen Martin Ferris told us about the Museum collections and gave us a tour of the Glamorgan Spring Bay Historical Society rooms. Terese Binns drove the Veterans & Community Bus while Steve Radford provided historical commentary. The weather was beautiful, and we had a delicious lunch at the Artifakt Gallery & Café.



Historical Treasure Hunt

On 18 November class 1/2 Jales from Glen Dhu Primary School bussed to Prince's Square for a morning of history and fun. After identifying, from old photographs, numerous historic buildings and churches around the square, they plotted Dr Pugh's walk to work through the square from his home *Nelumie* to St John's Hospital, now *Morton House*. They read information about the many different uses of the area, including a clay pit for making bricks for St John's Church, a rubbish dump, a parade ground and finally a beautiful park which we can enjoy today. Together they decided that the spikes on the top of the D'Osne fountain are not a pineapple but in

fact a bunch of bull rushes, most fitting for the water theme of the structure.

Leaving the square and proceeding down St John Street, the children identified several historic buildings along the walk including the Jewish synagogue, Shepherd's bakery, Crabtree Corner, St Andrew's Church and the City of Launceston coat of arms. The children were excited and busy learning that when walking around Launceston one must look up to see the history of our beautiful city. Carol Fuller.



14th Primary History Prize

There were 12 entries from three schools – Mowbray Heights, Invermay, and Evandale Primary Schools. The usual presentation ceremony in the Town Hall was not held again this year, but each school recognised the students in their own assemblies. Every child received a certificate of participation. Book vouchers from Petrarch's Bookshop totalling \$495 were presented to nine children. The third Rebecca Phillips Memorial Prize of \$50 was awarded to Shakira Walters from Mowbray Heights Primary School for her imaginative project on people who helped shape Tasmanian history (pictured). The History Prize sub-committee of Kelli Schultz, Carol Fuller and Brad Wood judged the entries.

Libraries Tasmania Transcriptions

Letter Book of Charles James Weedon, April 1831 – February 1836, Series Number: <u>NS7176</u>

The 68 letters provide an insight into the economic history of early Van Diemen's Land and Weedon's life in 1830s Launceston. Charles Weedon emigrated to Van Diemen's Land in 1831 aboard the *Thomas Laurie*. He was a merchant, prominent community member and a Member of Parliament.

Beware of Mrs Browne, Series Number: NS7195-1-1

The diaries of Harriett Gore Browne, Tasmanian Governor's wife, 1861 – 1869. She accompanied the Duke of Edinburgh to Launceston during his Royal Tour of January 1868. Her assessments of the people she met along the way are detailed and often amusing.
