#### **Anzac talk by Stephen Cornish**

Commander Stephen Cornish RAN presented an interesting, illustrated address on "A journey into family military history, or how I became an historian by accident" to the Launceston Historical Society meeting on 16 April 2023. The family connections are Parry, Briggs, Lee, Cooper, and Lawrence - all descended from Isaiah and Maria Briggs of Longford. Stephen focussed on his two great-uncles, paymaster Cyril Parry who wrote a diary and gunner Athol Parry who was killed on Gallipoli. An article about the talk was in *The Examiner* on 15 April 2023. #### **Tasmanian Pictorial Church Index**

On 21 May, Sandra Duck gave an overview of the church indexing project which began in the 1990s with St Bartholomew's Church at Apsley. Maureen Martin Ferris and Sandra have collected photos and basic information about 1,500 churches in Tasmania and Norfolk Island. Maureen's son, Toby, has developed a website and new app for the information gathered with links to references. They welcome contributions from the public. So far, 141 people have helped with the never-ending project. The website is taschurches.org. An article about the project was in *The Examiner* on 21 April 2023.

#### **Dr Barry Cotter & Inez Fitzgerald**

On 18 June, Moira McAlister presented a fascinating account of how she researched wrote about her great-greatgrandparents. Dr Barry Cotter's life was easier to research as it is well-documented in the newspapers, diaries, and official letters of the day. He arrived in Hobart in 1830 and was appointed as the Assistant Surgeon at Campbell Town where he was responsible for convicts. In 1835 he was dismissed for neglect of duty. Launceston, he met John Batman and sailed to Port Phillip with him. There are 52 entries in JP Fawkner's diary about Cotter's time in Melbourne.

Meanwhile, there are very few facts about Inez Seville Fitzgerald, but it appears she was born in Spain to an Irish father. She too spent time in Launceston, working as a milliner. She ventured to Melbourne with


the postmaster's family and married Dr Cotter in 1838. He amassed a fortune, the family returned to England but lost everything in the financial crash of the 1840s. The marriage fell apart, and they both married other people. Inez's story has been recreated by Moira in a historical fiction book called *Izzy*, where the few known facts can be linked together to tell a story of romance, betrayal, infidelity, shipwreck, destitution, courage, a fortune made and lost, death, exile, action, and adventure. #### **July Meeting**

### Jacqui Triffitt, *On the Front Foot: The Rise of Tasmanian Women's Cricket*Sunday 16 July 2023 – 2pm, Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum, Inveresk

Jacqui Triffitt is the author of *On the Front Foot: The Rise of Tasmanian Women's Cricket*. Jacqui is a past Tasmanian cricketer having represented Tasmania, playing 21 matches for her State, including being vice-captain. She has also been a state coach and administrator. Jacqui also played hockey for Tasmania.

On the Front Foot tells the fascinating and spirited story of Tasmanian women's cricket from its beginnings in 1891 to the emergence of Tasmanian Roar in 2009. And it's a history of firsts including Lily Poulett-Harris who founded organised women's cricket in Tasmania, and the Tasmanian team that played in the first interstate women's cricket match. Jacqui will talk about the emergence of women's cricket across Tasmania from the early 1900s on the North-West Coast and the tour of a Victorian team that played matches in Devonport, Wynyard, Latrobe, and Ulverstone. She will also talk about the influence of Mary Fox who was instrumental in developing a schoolgirl's competition and tours by a NSW schoolgirls and senior team to Launceston in the 1930s. She will discuss the evolution of women's cricket in the modern era, a professional sport watched by millions of spectators across Australia and around the world.

#### **August Meeting**

Tabatha Badger, Florence Perrin (1884-1952): botanist, bushwalker, philanthropist, photographer: How Launceston's Florence Perrin helped to shape our wild Tasmania.

Sunday 20 August 2023 – 2pm, Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum, Inveresk



Visionary Tasmanian bushwalker and botanist, Florence Perrin (1884-1952), lived an eclectic life, passionately devoted to the community and environment. Based in Launceston, 'Flossie' was drawn to the natural world, enjoying bushwalking, skiing, and photography in the Cradle Mountain-Lake St Clair region. The remote massif, Perrins Bluff was conferred in her honour in 1920. after six years of summiting many of the peaks in the region; was Florence the first female, post colonisation, to do so?

Over the course of her life Florence became a known figure in botanical specimen collection,

specialising in Tasmanian orchids, ferns, and most predominantly Australian seaweeds. With Professor A.H.S. Lucas she co-authored *Seaweeds of South Australia* and frequently lectured on her various study subjects to the Country Women's Association, Launceston Horticultural Society, Northern Branch of the Royal Society of Tasmania, and the Launceston Field Naturalists.

Florence owned much land at Low Head, she was a member of over a dozen boards and committees in any given year, and undertook significant philanthropic work; how did this extraordinary woman's life go largely undocumented until so recently? And what impact did the depth of her work have on the wild Tasmania we enjoy today?

As an ardent bushwalker and wilderness photographer, **Tabatha Badger** stumbled onto the enigmatic Florence Perrin's stereographic work in 2019. Quickly discovering there was, like many women of her time, little accurately recorded about this remarkable woman's life achievements, Tabatha began compiling a biography, which was completed in 2023. Tabatha is based in the Derwent Valley and runs a small conservation business.

#### **September Meeting**

Third Mead, Smith, von Stieglitz Lecture

Marion Sargent, *JM Haenke's architectural legacy* 

Sunday 17 September 2023 - 2pm, Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum, Inveresk



The architect Johannus Martyn Haenke worked in Launceston for nearly three and a half years from 1903 to 1906. He left behind a small number of significant buildings, despair amongst architects, and a broken heart. This lecture will trace Haenke's early days in Ipswich, the buildings he designed in Launceston, some of his private life, and his achievements in California and beyond. He reinvented himself and was loose with the facts, so trying to track him down was not an easy task. Marion Sargent is president of the Launceston Historical Society and spent 26 years as a librarian with the State Library of Tasmania. She passionate about history and loves researching.
