

On the Front Foot

Former state player Jacqui Triffitt gave a great talk on the rise of Tasmanian women's cricket on 16 July 2023. Her book *On the Front Foot* documents the history of women's cricket in Tasmania from the 1890s through to 2010. The book's cover demonstrates how far women have come from the players wearing long skirts and boater hats at Wynyard in 1907 to the present day with practical clothes and safety gear. The bat Erin Burns is holding goes through the line showing that women are breaking barriers. Lily Poulett-Harris from the Oyster Cove team is regarded as the founder of organised cricket in Tasmania. In the 1930s, Launceston became the centre of women's cricket when Mary Fox encouraged schoolgirls' cricket.

Florence Perrin

On 20 August 2023, Tabatha Badger presented a fascinating insight into the life of Florence Perrin. With her husband George Perrin, she ventured into Tasmania's wilderness areas. walking, skiing, and photographing the unique flora. Perrin's Bluff was named in her honour. Florence was avid collector of seaweeds. an orchids, and ferns, and was involved in more than a dozen organisations. Florence passed away on 25 April 1952 aged 68. She was ahead of her time and tried hard to have her voice heard in support of women and the environment. Tabatha is writing a book on Florence Perrin, to finally give her the recognition she deserves.



J Martyn Haenke's architectural legacy

Johannus Martyn Haenke was born in Ipswich. Queensland in 1877 to German immigrant parents. After working with architects in Ipswich and Melbourne, in 1903 he moved to Launceston and signed on with leading builder J&T Gunn. On 17 September LHS President Marion Sargent presented a marvelous, illustrated lecture on Haenke's professional achievements and personal life in Tasmania and further afield. During the three and a half years he was in Launceston, Haenke was responsible for several major projects, including the remodeling of the Launceston Hotel, the renovation of F&W Stewart's jewellery store, and the design of the Tasmanian Woolgrower's building (now Spotlight) in Cimitiere Street. He also designed Victoria League House, Lyttleton Street, in grand Art Nouveau style - so grand it was believed to have well exceeded his client's budget! Haenke left Launceston in June 1906, somewhat under a cloud, for undercutting competitors' quotes and failing to pay for fiancé Blanche Withington's engagement ring. He decamped to America soon after. Though inclined to stretch the truth about his origins and qualifications, Haenke was a man of

considerable talent who went on to become a prominent architect in California. He died in Los Angles in 1963.

October Meeting

Prue McCausland, The Albert Hall and the Tasmanian Exhibition 1891-92

Sunday 15 October 2023 – 2pm, Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum, Inveresk

The iconic Albert Hall at the north-west corner of City Park was built for the Tasmanian Exhibition of 1891-92 by the Launceston City Council at cost of £12,000. Half a million locally-made bricks were used in its construction. For the Exhibition, large temporary annexes were erected over parts of City Park. These housed displays of manufactured goods and art works from Tasmania, the mainland colonies, Great Britain, Canada, France and New Zealand. Over 243,000 people attended the Exhibition when Launceston's population was only 17,000.

From Trove: The Examiner, Tuesday 16 June 1903, page 4

The Tourist Traffic – During the past tourist season striking evidence was afforded of the inadequacy of accommodation of a first-class character obtainable in this city and other parts of the state. In view of the increasing numbers of visitors to Northern Tasmania, improvements are being made to several of the existing hotels and boarding houses, while new buildings are in course of erection. In the city extensive preparations in this direction have commenced, and the proprietress of the Launceston Hotel has made arrangements for extensive additions and alterations to her house. Another front storey is to be added, and downstairs a general transformation is to be effected. A start was made yesterday. As has been previously mentioned, a new coffee palace containing about 100 rooms is to be erected in Tamar-street.
