The Albert Hall & the International Exhibition

On Sunday 15 October 2023, Prue McCausland presented a fabulous talk on the Albert Hall, the Tasmanian Exhibition it was built for, the Launceston Family Album project of over 1,000 people who had season tickets, and the Denison Gorge picnic held at the end in March 1892. The Exhibition was a resounding success with thousands of people attending over four months from when it opened on 25 November 1891. A public holiday was declared, special trains ran, and a procession from Market Square with 2,850 people marched to the Albert Hall. Annexes across City Park displayed a working bakery, machinery, fine arts, and businesses such as Boags Esk Brewery. Campbell's Pottery. and Walch & Birchalls stationers. The Exhibition choir and orchestra, a Punch & Judy show, The Muffs, a tug-a-war, wood chopping, and Blondin walking a tightrope pushing a wheelbarrow with a child from the audience entertained the crowds. The Albert Hall, the most enduring legacy of the Exhibition, was restored after becoming dilapidated in the 1960s. The glass extension was added in 1984 and when the current renovations are completed it will once again be used for many events.





Local Heritage in Launceston

Michelle Blake, a freelance historian and research assistant. drew a crowd of 100 people to our last meeting of the year on 19 November 2023. She demonstrated public history in action by highlighting several residential areas of Launceston and the changes that have taken place over time and continue today. From quirky little Sheppy Street to the grand St George's Square; old Elphin Farm with mid-twentieth century social housing; to Newstead House with its infill of interwar houses in the surrounding crescent; and the popular planned suburb of Mowbray Heights Estate from 1927. These suburbs reflect the times in which they were developed, with a mix of architectural styles of heritage buildings and more modern houses. They are all part of the story of how Launceston has evolved over the last 200 years. Community sentiment on various developments was touched upon. Michelle said, "History is what happened in the past, but heritage is what remains of the past." We are fortunate to have retained so many heritage buildings.

East Tamar Excursion



On Monday 6 November 2023, a group of 23 members enjoyed the annual Launceston Historical Society excursion along the East Tamar. We visited Hillwood Berries for morning tea and a historical overview of the farm, and at Lefroy, Steve Radford talked about the town's mining history. At George Town, Des Wootton conducted a tour of the town before we stepped back in time at the Watch House Museum. After a lunch of fish and chips at Low Head, we explored the Pilot Station Museum, the foghorn building, and the Marine Education Centre. Our last stop was at St Matthias' Church, where members of Windermere Church Forever told us about the history of the building and tales from the graveyard.

Old Perth Gaol Archaeological Dig



Launceston Historical Society members and Southern Archaeology recently held a community dig near Perth looking for the old gaol. And they found it! Solid stone walls, brick paving, post holes, buttons, glass, clay pipes, an 1827 coin, and more were uncovered during five days of hard work. Darren Watton and John Dent will reveal more of their findings at the LHS talk on 17 November 2024 after their report has been written.

16th Primary History Prize

There were 93 entries from five schools – Evandale, Mowbray Heights, St Thomas More's, Launceston Christian School and, for the first time, Exeter Primary. Each school recognised the students in their assemblies and every child received a certificate of participation. Topics ranged across Aboriginal history, convicts, Port Arthur, the women's hospital, City Park, Tasmania's first airport, Highfield at Stanley, and the extinction of the thylacine.

Book vouchers from Petrarch's Bookshop totalling \$673 were presented to 17 children. The History Prize subcommittee of Carol Fuller, Brad Wood, and Prue McCausland judged the entries.
