Archaeological Dig at Mountford Cottage, Perth

Our meeting held on 19 October 2025, celebrated the annual Mead, Smith, von Stieglitz Lecture, exploring the fascinating story of Mountford Cottage in Perth. Guest speakers **John Dent and Sam Diprose-Adams** (on behalf of Darren Watton) shared insights drawn from both historical research and the October 2024 community archaeology dig, organised by the Launceston Historical Society. Together, their work brought to life the people, places, and discoveries uncovered during the dig, revealing new insights into the history of Mountford Cottage and the Perth region.

John began the talk by tracing the history of the property, including the original landholders, James Thornloe and later George Palmer Ball, before it was sold to Alexander Clerke. It subsequently passed to the Mackinnon family, who have owned the property for four generations. John also shared the history of the Powell family, long-term residents of the home, whose lives were brought to light through his research.

Sam then guided the audience through the archaeological process, explaining how a dig unfolds and how artefacts help build a picture of the past. The excavation revealed the layout of the building and uncovered

thousands of artefacts, including buttons, nails, marbles, bottles, coins, and military-related items such as a ring and a commemorative token.

A particularly moving moment from the dig came when a neighbour shared an incredible historic photograph of Roy Powell standing outside the cottage, connecting the research directly to the people who once lived there. The excavation also revealed a major surprise, the house was constructed in the 1840s, around thirty years earlier than previously thought.

The lecture was followed by afternoon tea, providing a wonderful opportunity for members and guests to discuss the talk, share reflections, and connect over history and community.

Debunking the myth of "Wauba Debar"

The final Launceston Historical Society meeting for the year was held on Sunday 16 November at the QV Museum at Inveresk. **Louise Zarmati and Bradley Wood** presented a thoroughly intriguing and meticulously researched investigation into the well-known headstone of 'Wauba Debar' near Bicheno.



There are three sources of information at the historic site: the gravestone placed there in 1855; a memorial installed by the Australian Merchant Navy in 2003; and a Bicheno History Trail information board erected in 2019. There are significant contradictions between these three sources creating a genuine history mystery.

The headstone states that Wauba Debar, a female Aborigine of Van Diemen's Land, died in June 1832 aged 40 and was erected in 1855 by a few of her white friends. The Navy memorial tells us that she was born in 1792 and died in 1832 and was a heroine of the sea. The history panel says she died before 1816, was a strong swimmer and rescued two sealers, one of them her husband.

Louise and Brad investigated the secondary sources that may have been used to arrive at the different dates and further embellishments. These include James Kelly's 1815-16 Log written in 1854, newspaper articles of 1893, and KR von Stieglitz' book *Pioneers of the East Coast* published in 1955. These were deemed unreliable sources.

There are four primary sources that provide historical facts. Firstly, Henry Rice's report of his exploratory expedition to the east coast states that on 30 December 1820 they left Moulting Lagoon and buried Archibald Campbell's black woman at Stoney Beach Harbour. Secondly, Reverend Knopwood's diary of 7 July 1814 notes that Archibald Campbell had a native woman living with him. Thirdly, on 20 August 1814 the VDL Gazette and General Advertiser reported that Campbell's black woman went to Hobart to see the Lieutenant Governor. Finally, on 4 May 1818 Knopwood christened eight-year-old Maria (Marie) Campbell – a native girl of VDL – Archibald Campbell's daughter.

Louise and Brad concluded that the Aboriginal woman buried at Stoney Beach Harbour, later named Waubs Bay, had a long relationship with Campbell and was buried in December 1820. She was a mother, a translator and go-between with local aborigines and the government. The lone gravestone, until now, was a mystery that people felt they had to fill with stories about sealers and heroic rescues at sea. They were nothing but speculation and entertaining fiction, not historical facts.

Hobart Excursion

The Launceston Historical Society excursion to the Hobart Convict Penitentiary on 27 October was a great success. The Penitentiary is well worth a visit. We were privileged to have Professor Hamish Maxwell-Stewart explain the Digital History Tasmania project which has created the exciting Convict Memorial displaying transcriptions of 75,000 convict stories and perhaps an Al image of what they might have looked like.

The excellent National Trust guides took us around the site to see the 1834 chapel of which two rooms were converted into courtrooms in 1857. We didn't have time to see the immersive

Archaeological Dig at 56 Frederick Street

The Launceston History Centre's archaeological dig at the old Frederick Street kindergarten from 24 to 28 November 2025 was a resounding success. Lots of LHC members, La Trobe university students and a school group volunteered to dig five trenches, revealing lots of artefacts. Work continued through sunshine, wind and rain under the supervision of Darren Watton of Southern Archaeology.

Among the unearthed items were marbles, pieces of ceramic, bottles, coins, a Jory and Campbell brick, bones and plastic toys including a dinosaur. They now need to be cleaned, catalogued and interpreted to help with understanding more of the history of the site and the people who lived, studied and played there.

Originally built in 1836 the main building has been an infant school, a state school, Ladies Collegiate Institute, a private primary school, the Launceston Free Kindergarten and the Lady Gowrie Early Learning Centre. Now owned by the City of Launceston council a 20-year lease has been granted to the Launceston History Centre – a collaboration between the Launceston Historical Society, Tasmanian Family History Society (Launceston Branch) and Friends of the Launceston Mechanics' Institute. Fun fact: Helen Reddy's aunt Kathleen Reddy was born here in July 1911, probably in the schoolhouse somewhere on the site.
