#### Life Memberships

Anne Bartlett and Marion Sargent were conferred Honorary Life Memberships of the Launceston Historical Society at the AGM on 19 February 2017. This honour was bestowed in recognition of their outstanding leadership and tireless service to the objectives of the Society.

On 19 February Peter Richardson spoke on volumes of books 25.000 the and periodicals saved from the Launceston Mechanics' Institute library (1842-1945). The collection has been assessed as nationally significant and worth keeping. Volunteers from the Friends of the Launceston Mechanics' Institute (FOLMI) are cataloguing, conserving and studying this time capsule of life in Launceston. The LMI building was lost in 1971, but the collection survives.

# April Talk

### Bradley Wood: Digging in a Flanders Field

### Sunday 9 April 2017 – 2pm at the Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum at Inveresk

In April 2013 whilst touring the battlefields of Belgium a series of coincidences led Bradley Wood to become involved in the excavation of the partial remains of an Australian WWI soldier. This presentation tells the story of the initial excavation and subsequent research to discover what occurred in a Flanders field almost one hundred years ago.

**Bradley Wood** is a researcher and writer who specialises in military history. He has developed educational materials for textbooks and conducted research for use in library and museum exhibitions in New South Wales and Victoria. Most recently he designed the <u>http://165anzacs.org/</u> website which commemorates the WWI servicemen listed on the Holy Trinity Church, Launceston memorial board.

#### King's Memorial – The Foundation Stone laid by the General

Lieutenant General Robert Baden-Powell said that he had been struck by the beautiful surroundings, and it afforded him great pleasure to accede to the wishes of the people of Launceston to name the reserve. This monument [King Edward VII] was on the site of the first battery that was erected for the defence of Tasmania. The old buildings in the reserve were originally the military barracks, the quarters of the soldiers of the Sovereign. Before long it was probable that a naval drill hall would be erected near the river for the sailors of the King, and ere long the memorial to his late Majesty would be completed. Under these circumstances, the name selected appeared to be most appropriate, and with great pleasure he named the grounds "The Royal Park". (*The Examiner*, 10 June 1912, page 6)

Professor Milton Cohen: What would Pugh say? Reflections on pain, practice and propriety

**Professor Milton Cohen** is a specialist pain medicine physician and rheumatologist on the St Vincent's Sydney Campus. He is a Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians and a past Dean of the Faculty of Pain Medicine of the Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists.

Dr Cohen has been a leader in the development of pain medicine as a discipline, in the education and training of pain physicians and in raising the profile of "pain" in the broader medical community. His interests and publications are broad and include issues in pain theory and practice, rational pharmacotherapy for pain and implications of persistent pain for public policy or, as he puts it, "from the spinal cord to the supreme court".

### Vale Dr John Morris AO MBE FRACP:

John was a stalwart of the Society, regularly attending the Sunday meetings. He was treasurer for nine years, from March 1998 to April 2007. John presented four talks to the Society between 2000 and 2007 on medical history, Dr Clifford Craig and growing up in rural Tasmania. In 2013, as part of our celebration to mark the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Society we facilitated the reprinting of the book *History in our Streets: The Origins of Launceston Street Names* by John and his son Don. ### John West & William Slatyer

Saul Eslake discovered during his research for the John West lecture that one of his great-greatgrandfathers conducted the funeral service for Reverend John West in Sydney on 21 December 1873. Reverend William Slatyer was the Minister at the Pitt Street Congregational Church. He was, by all contemporary accounts, a rather pompous and sour old git, and the sermon he gave at West's funeral doesn't do anything to counter that impression. Slatyer not only looked severe but was indeed severe. It was said at his own funeral that he had "all the sternness of a Cromwell with none of the poetry of a Milton". His eldest son William Roy Slatyer became estranged from him, and for reasons unknown to his descendants, changed his surname to 'Eslake', sometime in the late 1860s or early 1870s.

#### Speaking of West, Saul's great-great-grandfather said:

He realized, as but few do, his sacred and sublime vocation, to serve his own generation. 'No man', it is most fittingly said of him, 'ever undertook the duty entrusted to him with a profounder sense of the responsibility which that trust involved, and with a more entire devotion to its fulfilment'. His sense of the power of the Press amounted to a passion; and this power, he maintained, should be wielded wholly for the public good. ... [He had] the happy knack of putting his case – the vein of quiet humour which often ran through what he said – the dignity and modesty, but withal, confidence, with which he advanced his opinions ... the apropos anecdote with which he frequently illustrated or wound up his statement – and above all his telling denunciations of vice, social, public or political – his wise, cautious and weighty counsels in seasons of great public excitement.



### To May from Jack ...

This woven silk postcard was sent to the Launceston Historical Society by a lady in Wurruk, Victoria whose mother was a collector.

During WWI, an estimated eight to ten million such cards were produced in France to supply the need for soldiers to keep in touch with their loved ones at home. Colourful embroidered flags, regimental badges and flowers accompanied sentimental messages to mothers, wives, sweethearts and sisters.

Using the clues contained within the card – to a sister Miss May Burns, C/- Blundell's Emporium, from brother Jack Burns – Launceston LINC staff member Hanna was able to trace the identity of its writer. The 1928 electoral roll contained a listing for Mary Easton Burns, shop assistant, at a Cimitiere Street address. Also at this address was railway worker John Alexander Burns. WWI service records confirmed that John Alexander Burns served in France in WWI.

#### May and Jack were Mary and John!

Although he was wounded in action a few months after writing this card, Jack survived the war and returned home in 1919. On 30 May 1928, *The Examiner* reported his marriage to Jean Sheriff. The bride carried a beautiful bouquet of chrysanthemums, carnations, roses and trailing satin ribbons made by the groom's sister May...

Signaller JA Burns, 40<sup>th</sup> Battalion. *Weekly Courier*, 7 July 1916, p. 24.

John Alexander Burns was born at Deloraine on 5 April 1897 to James and Maria Burns. Employed as a telegraphist, he was 18 years old when he enlisted in the 40<sup>th</sup> Battalion on 5 February 1916. He embarked on the *Berrima* for France where he served as a signaller. Jack was transferred to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Australian Division Signallers Company in May 1918. He returned to Australia on the *Rio Pardo*, disembarking in Hobart on 21 July 1919.

The postcard and other memorabilia are on display in the Launceston LINC.
