William Lushington Goodwin

After the AGM on 16 February Mike McCausland spoke on the life of Mr Goodwin. Born in Kent in 1798 he became a master mariner, claiming that he served in the Royal Navy, but there is no evidence of that. In 1831 he arrived in Sydney with 120 female convicts on the Kains, he managed to wreck the ship on the way out of the Tamar River in September that year and decided to stay in Launceston. The next phase of his life was as a newspaperman. Goodwin edited the Cornwall Chronicle from 14 February 1835, promising that "personality, scurrility, or abuse shall never disgrace our journal." He broke those promises, sparring with other newspapers and lampooning anyone in authority. He copied political cartoons from Bell's Life from 1836 to 1838, claiming he was the engraver. In later life Goodwin took on a public role, becoming a councillor, a Member of Parliament, Justice of the Peace and Magistrate. He died in August 1862. Mike is pictured with Marion Sargent.

The 32nd John West Memorial Lecture, held at UTAS on Friday 13 March by Professor Tim McCormack, Dean of Law at UTAS on *The Notion of Humanity as a Constraint on the Conduct of War* was excellent. He spoke about the emergence of the notion of humanity in war and the development of the rules of war from the mid-19th century.

President Marion Sargent was MC, Professor Dominic Geraghty from UTAS introduced Prof. McCormack and Secretary Prue McCausland offered a vote of thanks. Numbers were down to 58 this year due to the coronavirus outbreak.

LAUNCESTON. FURTHER PNEUMONIC CASES REPORTED. FIVE DOCTORS ILL.

Dr. Charles Irvine, whose case of illness was yesterday diagnosed as pneumonic influenza, is still in a serious condition. His residence has been isolated. Two other cases of pneumonia influenza were reported during the day, one a child twelve months old at the General Hospital, and the other a girl of ten years at a private residence. Both were conveyed to the Verulam Hospital by the motor-ambulance. There is another suspicious case under investigation.

It has been arranged that the doctor from the troopship *Frankfurt*, which arrived in Hobart last night, shall come up to Launceston immediately, and take charge of the Verulam Hospital. There are now five of the local doctors ill.

Many new cases were reported during the day, and probably, all told, some 500 people are now affected. Good work is being done by the relief depot at the Albert Hall, but more helpers are urgently required. Nurse Searle and Mrs. Muschamp, assisted by Miss Wilkinson visited 10 patients yesterday, and 80 new cases today, extending from King's Meadows nearly out to Mowbray. The Council has provided two motor-cars to enable the visits to be expeditiously made. Cooking appliances, comprising gas stoves and a boiler, have been installed at the Albert Hall. Mrs. Robson is in charge of this department, which is providing needful supplies to distressed persons.

Messrs R. E. Lee (East Launceston), Walter Wright (Invermay), and A G Waterworth (Glen Dhu), State school headmasters, attended and look charge of the organisation at the Albert Hall today. Boy Scouts were employed in carrying messages, and otherwise assisting.

The Chief Inspector of Health (Mr. J Riley) is in Launceston to meet the s s Wainui upon her arrival here from Melbourne tomorrow morning, to make arrangements regarding the surveillance of passengers. The vessel is expected to reach the wharf between 8 and 9 o'clock.

A CLEAN CITY.

"We can now reasonably say that Launceston is a clean city," remarked the Mayor (Alderman G. Shields) at yesterday's council meeting in referring to the influenza epidemic. He considered that not only Launceston, but the state as a whole, was extremely fortunate in having fought the scourge with such a measure of success. Their best thanks were due to the hospital staffs, and the band of voluntary workers, for the splendid assistance rendered by them during the epidemic. Mr. Storrer deprecated the reports spread by people that several fresh cases had occurred and said that an example should be made of anyone caught issuing false rumours. Mr. Sadler said they were indebted to the Mayor, Messrs. Storrer and Hart, for excellent work rendered by them throughout the epidemic, also to all voluntary helpers. He moved - "That they be accorded a hearty vote of thanks." Mr. Ockerby seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.
