The significance of the Tamar Valley/Launceston region for Tasmanian Aboriginal people



Geoff McLean (pictured) is a Tasmanian Aboriginal historian and knowledge sharer. Geoff was a former lecturer at the University of Tasmania in First Nations histories and cultures and is still engaged by the School of Education as a tutor/marker in units with a First Nations focus. In addition to that Geoff runs a small business, Wallaby Walkabout Tours, where he provides Tasmanian Aboriginal histories and cultures experiences to school groups and others. As part of that he also provides Professional Learning and Cultural Awareness sessions for teachers/other educators and school staff, and Cultural Awareness sessions for companies, businesses, or any other interested groups.

Geoff has gained much of his knowledge not from just his own research, but also from Elders such as Aunty Patsy Cameron and Uncle Murray Everett who Geoff has worked with and spent time 'on-country' in various places of Tasmanian Aboriginal cultural and spiritual significance, such as Sundown Point, West Point, Rocky Cape, Narawntapu, Risdon Cove and, naturally our own wonderful Cataract Gorge.


For this presentation, Geoff will focus on the significance of the Tamar Valley/Launceston region for Tasmanian Aboriginal people. For decades this region has attracted little in the way of research and some historians have discounted it as having any importance at all. However, as you will find out there is great significance of the areas and most likely a Tasmanian Aboriginal occupation of the Tamar Valley/Launceston for around 35,000 years.

The 35th John West Memorial Lecture

Dr Nick Brodie

The Long Shadow of John West's War

Sunday 19 March 2023 – 2pm, Meeting Room, Queen Victoria Museum, Inveresk



Abstract:

John West's History of Tasmania occupies a significant place in the historiography of the Vandemonian War. While written well within living memory, West's treatment of the conflict reflects the conventions and preoccupations of an extant body of Vandemonian literature. Intensely concerned with ethnography, nineteenth century histories tended to produce a familiar narrative frame with regard to matters Aboriginal. As such, like other contemporary texts, West's history remains a problematic resource when mined by historians for historical data. This lecture delves into that conundrum, with an eye to the lingering effects of West's account of the conflict.

Dr Nick Brodie is the author of several history books, including 1787 and The Vandemonian War, as well as numerous peer reviewed articles and essays about Tasmania's frontier history and historiography. He is presently the Dean of Academic Studies at Jane Franklin Hall.

A LOST SEAL. – The young seal brought to town in the cutter *Albion*, and which its owner intended to present to the collection in the Town Park, has gone on an exploring expedition on its own account. It was being shown to some visitors on board the vessel about 11 a.m. yesterday, when it made a dart over the side and into the river. The tide was full, and the seal headed across the flats for the Cataract, occasionally coming to the surface to breathe. Several persons pursued it in boats, but the animal made good its escape, and may perhaps be heard of as a "bunyip" up the Cataract, or in the First Basin. The owner of the lost seal, however, informs us that there were hundreds on Barren-Joey Island when the *Albion* called there last Thursday, and that on her next trip he will call in and endeavour to bring up a couple of young seals for the Town Park. This is a liberal spirit to display, and the public will be much indebted if the seals are safely lodged in the Park, as they are a novelty to most townsfolk, and make very entertaining pets.

FIRE. A small fire occurred to-day on the premises of Mr. E. L. Ludbrook, draper, at the corner of Brisbane and St. John streets. A boy employed in the establishment lit the gas in the cellar, and threw away the match, which fell among some kapok, which immediately became alight. The boy became frightened and ran away. The fire brigade was summoned, but the fire was extinguished by a few buckets of water before their arrival. Ludbrook's is a large three-storey building, next to the Launceston Hotel.
