

BECOME A HISTORY DETECTIVE



YOUR MISSION: Choose a
Tasmanian mystery from the
past, gather clues, and uncover
the story behind it.

Step 1: Pick a Tasmanian Mystery to Investigate!

Here are some ideas to get you started,

or you can choose your own:

Who lived here? Research an old house, building, or landmark near you. Who used to live or work there? What was life like back then?

The case of the missing species! Investigate an extinct or endangered Tasmanian animal—what happened to it?

<u>Convict clues!</u> Find out about a real convict who came to Tasmania—why were they sent here? What happened to them?

<u>The time capsule puzzle!</u> Find an old photograph, an interesting newspaper article, or a special object and find out what it tells us about the past.

<u>Vanishing history!</u> Discover what happened to a Tasmanian tradition, business, or historical site that no longer exists.

<u>Family history mystery!</u> Ask a grandparent, older relative or family friend about their childhood—what was different back then?

Step 2: Gather Your Clues! Detectives need evidence! Try these ways to uncover clues:

- Visit your local or school library to find books, maps, or records about Tasmania's history.
- Look at old photos, maps, or newspaper articles (you can search <u>Trove</u> online to read old newspapers!)
- Visit a museum or historical site to find more information.
- Talk to a family member, neighbour, or local historian.
- Search the internet for information on Tasmanian history.

<u>Step 3:</u> Solve the Mystery & Present Your Findings! Choose <u>ONE</u> fun way to share what you've discovered:

- CREATE A 'CASE FILE' Assemble a folder with clues, evidence, pictures, and a written summary of your mystery.
- MAKE A SHORT VIDEO Film yourself as a detective revealing the mystery with clues, evidence, and a conclusion.
- DETECTIVE JOURNAL Write journal entries from the perspective of a detective solving the case, with sketches, maps, images, and important information.
- MYSTERY POSTER Design a poster with creative visuals highlighting the mystery's important information, clues, and people.
- POWERPOINT PRESENTATION Design a slideshow. Include slides with information for each clue and a final slide with a conclusion. Use pictures and text to create the presentation.

Step 4: How Long Should Your Project Be?


Just like a mystery needs enough clues, your project needs the right amount of information!

WRITING OPTIONS

Case File, Journal, Poster, or PowerPoint

If you're in Year 3 & 4: Write up to 300 words - That's about 1 full page in your A4 exercise book.

If you're in Year 5 & 6: Write up to <u>500 words</u> - That's about 2 to 3 pages in your A4 exercise book.



VIDEO OPTION

Making a video instead? - Keep it to about <u>3 minutes</u>. That's about the same length as one song or a short cartoon.

Include a <u>List of References -</u> At the end of your project, include a list of where you found your information.

A <u>List of References</u> is a list of the books, websites, and other sources you used for your research. It helps show where you found your information.

What to Include in your List of References

<u>For each source, include:</u> The author's name (if there is one), the year it was made or published, the <u>title</u> of the book, article, image, or website, where you found it (the <u>name</u> of the publisher or website)

Book:

Author's Last Name, First Name. Year. Title of the Book. Publisher.

Example: Smith, John. 2015. History of Tasmania. ABC Publishing.

Website:

Author's Last Name, First Name (if available). Date. "Title of the Page." Website Name, Website Link.

<u>Example:</u> Smith, John. 2022. "Convict Life in Tasmania." Australian History Online, www.australianhistory.com.au/convicts.

Step 5: Submit Your Investigation!

TIPS FOR PARENTS & CARERS TO HELP KIDS BECOME HISTORY DETECTIVES

- <u>Ask Questions</u> Encourage children to ask questions like, "What happened here?" or "Why is this important?" This will get them thinking like a detective, looking for clues in history. Try it on the drive to school or while walking through the city.
- Make History Fun Tell stories about the past! Ask friends and relatives to tell stories about what they remember from their childhood and read books about history, especially ones that feel like adventures.
- <u>Use Clues from the Past</u> Show children old photos, maps, or objects. These are like clues they can use to learn about the past.
 You can find these in local museums, online, or in old family collections.
- <u>Explore History Together</u> Visit local historical places or look at old books and websites to discover more clues. Exploring together will make it more fun!
